For those renting a car from the airport, here are directions to campus: Enter I-40 Westbound from the airport. Stay on I-40 West into downtown Nashville. Exit #209 Broadway. Head West on Broadway for approximately two blocks. The road will split and Broadway will continue to left. Merge left onto Broadway. Follow Broadway and turn right on Grand Ave to enter campus. Turn left for short term metered visitor parking.

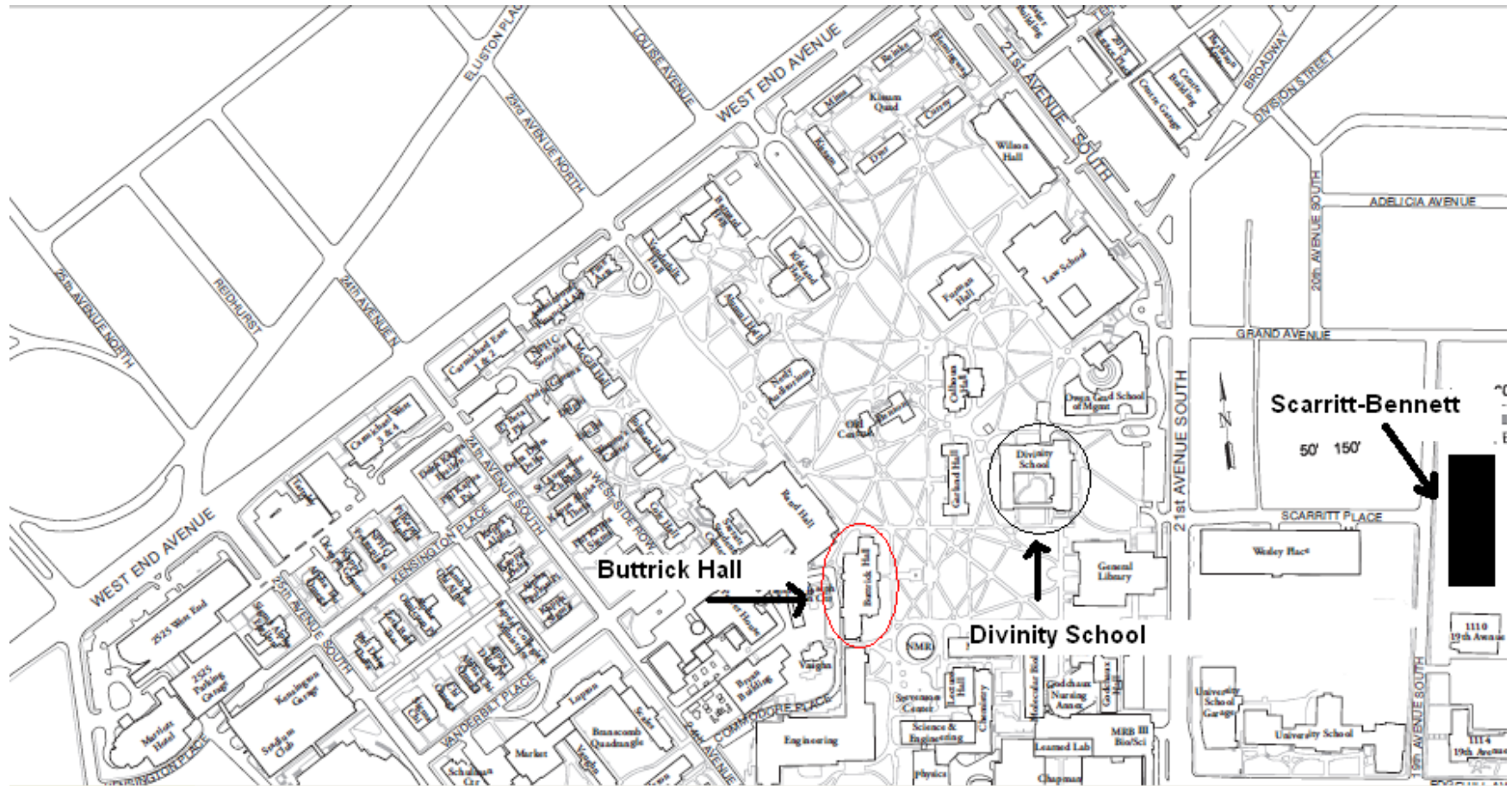
